Introduction: Concluding a Gospel with Blessing

- 1. Jesus ascended pronouncing blessing
 - a. We think of blessing as "wishing someone well"
 - **b.** Bible examples of blessing
 - **C.** Blessing is done in faith, we are talking not simply to God we are talking to people, but intending God to be the one to act.
 - We are speaking to the person what God already intends.
 - This sounds presumptuous to us. But we can pronounce what God intends and has already promised: "He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?" Rom 9:32)
 - d. Distinguishing between our blessing and "prophetic blessing"
 - **e.** Jesus' blessing likely involved what He had just said.
 - f. It is a Christlike thing to do to pronounce blessing
- 2. Jesus ascended to glory and honour
 - **a.** Psalms 93-99
 - **b.** Psalm 110:1–3
 - C. Psalm 2:8 Ask of me and I will give you the nations for your inheritance.
 - **d.** Daniel 7:13-15 "I saw in the night visions, and behold, with the clouds of heaven there came one like a son of man, and he came to the Ancient of Days and was presented before him. And to him was given dominion and glory and a kingdom, that all peoples, nations, and languages should serve him; his dominion is an everlasting dominion, which shall not pass away, and his kingdom one that shall not be destroyed."
 - **e.** Matt 28:18-20
- **3.** Our response is blessing God though our Lord Jesus Christ

Conclusion: The good news is Jesus ascended to subdue all his enemies. Therefore our blessing is valid, and we can bless God--pronouncing our confidence in His glorious work.
