## Considering The Messenger 1 Corinthians 2:1-5

## Introduction:

- The problem of the divisions
  - Paul uses effective and persuasive rhetoric in his preaching
  - Paul wants them to follow him ("imitate me") but he doesn't want them to so join themselves to a leader that they rely on him and not Christ. (Was Paul crucified for you, or were you baptised in the name of Paul?)
- So Paul has emphasised <u>the message</u> is not one that appeals to man's wisdom.
- Paul then raises the issue of <u>their own calling</u>.
   Not many wise, noble, influential.

We've focused on the message (18-25), the recipients (26-31), and this morning we will look at the preacher (2:1-5).

- 1. The (overall) method
  - a. Not with human eloquence
  - b. Determination to know nothing
     but Christ crucified

- 2. The messenger
  - a. Weakness
  - b. Fear and trembling

- 3. The message
  - a. Preaching--not human wisdom
  - b. Demonstration--Spirit and power
  - c. Object of faith--power of God
